President's Message: by Bob Roden, President

I am pleased to report that we have completed another very successful year. It has been a particularly eventful year in the heritage community, as we have been celebrating the Sesquicentennial – the 150th Anniversary of Canada's Confederation. In addition to our usual ongoing activities, here are some of the things your Society has achieved in the past 12 months.

In June, the Swansea Historical Society was recognized by Rev. Dr. Cheri DiNovo at her annual Community Appreciation Gala. Cheri presented us with a framed certificate, which will be on view at our October meeting. The certificate reads: *“As your Member of Provincial Parliament, I am pleased to recognize your service and dedication in the riding of Parkdale-High Park. **Thank You, Swansea Historical Society** For the exemplary contributions you have made and continue to make championing the preservation and promotion of the Swansea community. Your organization enhances the local area and makes Parkdale-High Park a great place in which to live”.*

Also in June, Marilyn Boustead, Marjorie Horeis, Lance Gleich, and Wallace Boustead received Volunteer Service Awards from the Ontario Ministry of Citizenship and Immigration. These people rose to the occasion and answered the call for help in 2012 when the Society was in a state of turmoil. Thank you Marilyn, Marjorie, Lance, and Wallace for your many contributions to our organization over the past five years, and hopefully into the foreseeable future. We hope the experience has been as rewarding for you as it has for the Society.

We conducted 3 historical walking tours. In May, under the auspices of the Jane's Walks programme, we led a walk to Sculpture Hill in High Park, marking the 50th anniversary of the public art which was installed in 1967 – Canada's Centennial year. As part of Heritage Toronto's walking tour programme, we conducted two tours of Eastern Swansea, one on our traditional June date and one in late August. The June walk attracted more than 100 participants, and the August walk attracted almost another 100. We have also taken over responsibility for the annual re-enactment of Governor Simcoe's 1793 expedition, a walking tour that Madeleine McDowell had organized and led every year since 1998. The 2017 Governor Simcoe walk will take place on Saturday, October 7, and we invite you all to join us. Thank you to Lance for organizing and leading all of our walks.

Working with a group of local historical societies, we participated in the August 2017 staging of “Walk the 6 West: History on the Humber” commemorating the 150th Anniversary of Canada's Confederation. Six theatrical presentations highlighting a variety of historical figures were mounted in Étienne Brûlé Park, and 4 guided walking tours along the Humber enabled viewers to watch each of the vignettes in turn. Even though the weather was threatening at first, more than 400 visitors attended. We thank the Province of Ontario and various private donors for financially supporting this highly successful event.

Also in August, and under the auspices of the City of Toronto's “Arts in the Parks” programme, we presented a Sesquicentennial Authors' Symposium in High Park. Twelve local writers,

including Canada's Parliamentary Poet Laureate George Elliott Clarke and SHS members Bianca Lakoseljac and Will O'Hara, read excerpts from their work.

I am happy to report that we now have speakers booked through most of 2018.

At the October 4 Annual General Meeting, those members in attendance will be electing an Executive to serve for the next twelve months. After the 2015 AGM, Margaret Lyons stepped forward to take on the vacant position of Secretary. Margaret has done a superb job for the past two years, but she has advised us that she is not able to stand for reelection, and so the Secretary position is vacant once again. We thank Margaret for all her work on behalf of the Society, and we are pleased that she will be staying on the Executive as a member-at-large. The Secretary position involves recording minutes from our members' meetings, Executive meetings, and AGM. We hope someone out there will be willing to take on this important role.

As for myself, I joined the Executive 13 years ago, after serving the Society as an auditor for several years before that. In the spring of 2012, I took on the job of President on an emergency basis when my predecessor resigned very suddenly. I have agreed to allow my name to stay on the Slate of Candidates for the coming year. However, I feel it would be in the best interests of both the Society and me if I could plan to move on in the near future, and I hope a suitable candidate will come forward soon. I have made a commitment that I will provide whatever support and guidance is needed to bring my replacement up to speed.

We are blessed with a very capable and dedicated Executive. Through their hard work and dedication, all of the current Executive members have played important parts in keeping the Society functioning. I want to thank all of the Board members for their many contributions over the years. I hope you, the members of the Society, will continue to support those who will be standing for re-election at the AGM. Also, in preparation for the elections, please give some thought as to how you could get more involved and share your talents with us. Or, perhaps you know of someone you would like to nominate (with that person's permission) for a position on the Executive. In either case, we would like to hear from you. We can never have too much help, fresh ideas are always welcome, and, as noted already, we really need a Secretary!

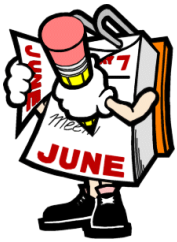


Humberside Collegiate 125th Anniversary Celebrations, October 20 and 21, 2017

Thursday, October 26, 2017, Etobicoke Historical Society, 7:30 pm, Montgomery's Inn (4709 Dundas St W) Barbara Dickson on “Bomb Girls...Trading Aprons for Ammo!” During WW2 over 21,000 patriotic men and women worked with high explosives filling munitions for the Allied Forces at a top-secret facility located in Scarborough. Over 170 buildings comprised the site, along with over 4 km of secret tunnels which remain as mysterious today as they were over seventy-five years ago. Wednesday November 1, 2017 SHS Meeting, 7:15 for 7:30 pm, Swansea Town Hall Speaker: John Sewell – “How We Changed Toronto in the 1970s, and How it has Changed Since”. John Sewell was elected as a City Councilor in 1969 and served as the Mayor of the City of Toronto from 1978 to 1980. He will speak about how development pressures were dealt with during a time of rapid change in our City. His thoughts and perspective from the 1970s are particularly relevant today as we are faced with ever-growing development issues that threaten the very fabric of our neighbourhoods. Mayor Sewell will be available to sign copies of his book after the presentation.

Sunday December 3, 2017 High Park Walking Tour, 10:30 am to 12 noon “High Park Through the Ages”. A guided tour to be led by Dave Berndorff. Meet at 10:30 am at the benches across the road from the south side of the Grenadier Restaurant in the middle of High Park.

Wednesday December 6, 2017 SHS Meeting, 7:15 for 7:30 pm, Swansea Town Hall Speaker: Bianca Lakoseljac. Bianca is a High Park resident and author, who was the lead organizer of the Sesquicentennial Authors' Symposium in High Park in August. She will speak to us about her latest novel “Stone Woman”, the story of a family of five women whose lives are bound by a Vietnam War draft dodger from the hippie “daze” of Toronto.

Wednesday February 7, 2018 SHS Meeting, 7:15 for 7:30 pm, Swansea Town Hall Speaker: John Beram – “The Beginnings of the Canadian Auto Industry”. John Beram, a local history enthusiast and story-teller, will return to Swansea to discuss the early days of the automobile industry in Canada, with special reference to the role of West Toronto in the development of the industry.

Wednesday March 7, 2018 SHS Meeting, 7:15 for 7:30 pm, Swansea Town Hall Speaker: Kelly Mathews – “Eaton Hall: Pride of King Township”. Shortly after the 1922 death of department-store heir John Craig Eaton, his widow Lady Flora Eaton had a palatial 72-room country estate built on the family's King City property. Rediscover an enchanting and bygone age with the life and history of Lady Eaton and her grand Eaton Hall, where she hosted many dignitaries including visiting British royalty.

Wednesday April 4, 2018 SHS Meeting, 7:15 for 7:30 pm, Swansea Town Hall Speaker: Garfield Portch is a Fellow of the Royal Philatelic Society of Canada – Canada's national stamp club since 1887. He will speak to us about the intrigues and politics involved in the establishment and operation of the Post Office in the Town of York, and subsequently the City of Toronto, in the 1800s.

Wednesday May 2, 2018 SHS Meeting, 7:15 for 7:30 pm, Swansea Town Hall Speaker: Gay Gooderham. The Gooderham and Worts families emigrated from England in the early 1830s to the Town of York, shortly before it became the City of Toronto. Over the following 75 years, these families created the largest distillery in the world, centred on the area we now know as Toronto's “Distillery District”. Many significant landmarks associated with the Gooderhams survive in Toronto today. Gay Gooderham will share the fascinating story of her family, and also talk about her work in creating an online website www.gooderham-worts.ca that includes a family tree with photos, documents, and stories.

Wednesday October 3, 2018 SHS Annual General Meeting & Elections, 7:30 pm, Swansea Town Hall Speaker: SHS Board Member and author Thelma Wheatley will return to the podium to talk about the subject of her latest book “Brown on White: Mixed-Race Marriage in Toronto in the 1960s”.

Wednesday December 5, 2018 SHS Meeting, 7:15 for 7:30 pm, Swansea Town Hall Speaker: Plum Johnson – “*They Left Us Everything*”. Plum Johnson is a Canadian writer raised in Oakville, who won the RBC Taylor Prize in 2015 for her memoir *They Left Us Everything*. In it, she describes discovering history in what parents leave behind, and about the importance of preserving it to make sense of the past.
